# OSI “Open Source™” Definition

- Free Redistribution permitted
- Source Code included
- Allow Distribution of Modifications
- No Discrimination of Users or Fields of Endeavour
- License must be Technology Neutral

# History

- In the Beginning nearly all Software was Open Source
- Since 1980 Closed Source became popular
- 1984 Richard Stallman founded the GNU project
- 1997 Eric Raymond published the well-known essay “The Cathedral and the Bazaar”
- Today: Open Source especially Linux is very popular and the foundation of the Internet

# Organization

- The “Open Source Movement” consists of an enormous number of loosely connected Projects
- The organization-structures of the Projects are very varying from democracy to dictatorship
- Additionally a lot of implicit rules are widely accepted
- Several Opinion Leaders influence the public appearance of the Open Source Movement

# Political Conflicts

- National Laws especially
  - Copyright vs. “Urheberrecht”
  - Export Restrictions
  - Wireless LAN radio regulation
  - DMCA/DRM
- Closed Standards and NDAs
- Software patents
- FUD campaigns (SCO, Microsoft...)
